IS THERE SUCH THING AS 'POPULIST CONSTITUTIONALISM'?

ABSTRACT

This workshop will examine recent deviation from the shared values of liberal constitutionalism towards a kind of 'populist, illiberal constitutionalism'. The participants will explore the relationship between populism and popular sovereignty, populist leaders' constitutional projects, and the use of legalism for their, often autocratic, agendas. Particular attention will be paid to 'populist constitutionalism' in the new democracies of East-Central Europe, contributing new perspectives to a theoretical debate which has so far largely focused on cases in other parts of Europe (Greece and Spain), Latin-America (Bolivia), and the US. The workshop also aims to address the broader theoretical question of whether populism and illiberalism are reconcilable with constitutionalism.
