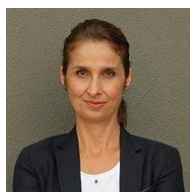


Speakers



Prof. Sule Alan

[Sule Alan](#) is Professor of Economics at the [European University Institute](#), Florence and an Adjunct Professor of Economics at [Bilkent University](#), Turkey. Her research interests include household behavior, education, gender and personal finance. She is affiliated with the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab ([J-PAL](#)), Innovations for Poverty Action ([IPA](#)) and [Character Lab](#). Alan has published widely on research that uses data collected in randomized field experiments.



Prof. Michele Belot

[Michele Belot](#) is Professor of Economics at the [European University Institute](#). She is a world-renowned scholar in the area of behavioral, labor and health economics, focusing on questions related to dietary habits and on how to advise job seekers. The overarching topic of her work is an interest in behavioral change. Much of her work is based on data collected in field experiments designed by Belot herself.



Dr. Guglielmo Briscese

Guglielmo Briscese is currently post-doctoral fellow at the University of Chicago. Previously, he was Senior Advisor for the [Behavioural Insights Team](#) (Sydney Office) and supervised randomized controlled trials applying behavioural insights in labour markets, mostly in collaboration with the Australian Ministry of Employment.



Dr. Maurizio Canavari

Maurizio Canavari holds a Laurea degree in Agricultural Sciences ([University of Bologna](#), 1990) and a Doctoral Degree in Appraisal and Land Economics (Padua, 1997). He is Associate Professor at the Alma Mater Studiorum, University of Bologna. His current research interests include agri-food marketing and marketing research, with specific topics regarding quality food specialties, organic food, e-commerce and wine business. He runs a yearly summer school on “Experimental Auctions: Theory and Applications in Food Marketing and Consumer Preference Analysis”.



Prof. Elias Dinas

[Elias Dinas](#) holds the Swiss Chair in Federalism, Democracy and International Governance (joint SPS/RSCAS chair) at the [European University Institute](#). He is on leave from the University of Oxford, where he is Associate Professor in Comparative Politics. His research interests include the dynamics of political socialization, the downstream effects of institutional interventions and the legacy of authoritarian rule on the ideological predispositions of citizens in new democracies. He has also a keen interest in research methodology with a specific interest in field experiments.



Dr. Benedikt Hermann

[Benedikt Hermann](#) is First Secretary of the Delegation of the European Union to Ukraine and a member of the Support Group for Ukraine in charge of decentralization and sectoral reforms. Previously, he led the “Behavioral Economics Team” of the Joint Research Centre, a think tank within the European Commission. He graduated first in natural sciences and later earned a PhD in economics, which led him to work at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and the Centre for Decision Research and Experimental Economics at Nottingham University. He has published widely in leading journals of various fields, like “Social Neuroscience”, “Science”, “American Economic Review” and “Quarterly Journal of Economics”.



Prof. Sander Onderstal

[Sander Onderstal](#) is professor of Strategy and Markets at the [Amsterdam Business School](#). His research interests include mechanism design, auctions, cartels, and behavioral economics. He regularly advises ministries, public organizations, and private parties on the design of auctions, including auctions for real estate, gasoline stations, radio frequencies and mobile telecommunications. Onderstal applies both laboratory and field experiments in his work.



Prof. Hessel Oosterbeek

[Hessel Oosterbeek](#) is professor of Economics of Education at the [Amsterdam School of Economics](#). Oosterbeek ranks among the most-cited Dutch economists and the world's leading education economists. His main research interests focus on the economics of education, development economics, and impact evaluation. He is one of the main advisors of the Amsterdam municipal government for designing mechanisms to allocate pupils to high schools.



Simon Ruda

[Simon Ruda](#) is Director of Home Affairs and International Programs at the UK [Behavioral Insights Team](#). He is responsible for BIT's work with the Home Office, Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Defense, Foreign and Commonwealth Office and DfID as well as multiple police forces and other government agencies. Simon also manages BIT's work with 20 foreign governments across Latin America, Asia and Europe. Simon was one of the original members of BIT and has led some of their most influential trials. He has over a decade of experience in behavior change, communications and public policy and lectured in behavioral science across the world.



Prof. Arthur Schram

[Arthur Schram](#) is professor of experimental economics at the [Amsterdam School of Economics](#) of the University of Amsterdam and visiting professor at the [European University Institute](#). His research interests include experimental economics, public economics, political economics, industrial organization and behavioral economics. He applies laboratory and field experiments in his research and is a regular advisor of Dutch governmental agencies for the design of mechanisms.
