Merlin Sophie Bootsmann

Research fellow at FU Berlin and as part of the DFG research unit 'Law Gender Collectivity' and Ph. D. student at FU Berlin. Her/their dissertation project is on the mobilisation of human rights by LGBTIQ* movements for education work, politics, and policy in the Federal Republic of Germany since the 1970s.

PhD student in History at the University of London. They are using oral history to investigate how different groups of queer young people in England came to explore, understand, and express their identities between 1970 and 2003.

Principal investigator of the DFG-funded project ('Sexual Diversity and Human Rights in 21st Century Japan: LGBTIQ Activisms and Resistance from a Transnational Perspective'). He is working at the Heinrich-Heine-University Düsseldorf.

Michela Balocchi

Sociologist, PhD in Sociology and Political Sociology. Marie Curie post-doctoral Fellow (2014-2017) with a project on the Sociological Aspects of the Management of Intersex Variations (INTERSEXIONS). The latter was a continuation and elaboration of her independent research on the issue, which she started working on at the end of 2008. Thanks to the first results, she opened the first information and welcome point for intersex people with all kinds of intersex variations in Italy, based in an LGBTQ+ association in Florence. In 2010, she came up with and organized the first multidisciplinary convention on the intersex topic in Italy. She has collaborated with many universities as a lecturer, adjunct professor, and researcher. She has been on the scientific board of the Center of Research PoliTeSse since its beginning, and on the scientific board of the Journal Sociologie. She is the cofounder of the group Intersexioni and the web-editor of the namesake website.

Stephan Mills

Stephan Mills, second year medical student at "UniCamillus International Medical University of Rome", and intersex activist with Intersexioni since 2019. He is a Lebanese American living in Italy since 2007. During his work as an activist, he has done many live streams, podcasts, interviews (both in written and in video forms), and has also participated in live events, in which he spoke about intersex issues/human rights and about his experience as an intersex person and as an activist, thus bringing visibility to the topic. He participated in various university research studies about life as an intersex person, by taking surveys / questionnaires and by being interviewed. In November of 2021, he raised funds for Intersexioni by taking part in a photo-shoot for the Le Sex En Rose 2022 calendar, whose goal was to portray masculinity in a healthy way (in contrast to "toxic masculinity"). In December of 2021, a short story he wrote called "Dear intersex body" was published in the YOUth&I magazine (Issue 2). In May of 2022, he participated in the ILGA World Conference 2022 online.

Linda Luv

Linda Luv is a performance artist and researcher who lives and works in Zurich, Lucerne and Frankfurt. Her works position themselves between artistic and transdisciplinary practices. In summer 2018 she completed her MA in Fine Arts at the HSLU Lucerne. She is the founder of the institute Myht, which is dedicated to the science of transgression. Since January 2019 she has been working on her PhD, in which she delves into the moment of transgression from the perspective of a young mother, woman and artist. Besides, she is part of the research project "collection the ephemeral" at the HSLU Lucerne, holds performance lessons and organizes different performance and art events.

Lee Campbell

Artist, experimental filmmaker, writer, Senior Lecturer at University of the Arts London, curator of regular performance poetry night *POW? Play on Words* in South London and founder of *Homo Humour*, the first of its kind project on contemporary queer male film and moving image practices that explore humour and LGBTQ+ storytelling. Lee's experimental performance

poetry films have been selected for many international film festivals since 2019 including *Queerbee LGBT Film Festival*, The Gilbert Baker Film Festival, Kansas 2020 and 2021, *HOMOGRAPHY*, Brussels and STATES OF DESIRE: Tom of Finland in the Queer Imagination, Casa de Duende, Philadelphia, USA, 2020 *WICKED QUEER* 2021, Boston, USA, *FilmPride* - Brighton & Hove Pride's official LGBTQ+ film festival, Brighton, UK, *Splice Film Festival* 2021, Brooklyn, USA and *Darkroom Festival*, London. He works as a Senior Lecturer at Wimbledon College of Arts, University of the Arts London. Lee also has a keen interest in critical performative pedagogy and has published extensively also in this field. Recently, he published his first book volume, *Leap into Action: Critical Performative Pedagogies in Art and Design Education* (Peter Lang USA). Lee's research has been published internationally in recent publications including *PARtake: The Journal of Performance as Research*, *Body Space Technology* and *Performance Paradigm*. He was awarded the University of Lincoln Best Practice Award in Promoting Equality in 2018 and a Loughborough University Teaching Innovation Award in 2015.

Tianqi Panda Zhang

Tianqi Panda Zhang is a graduate researcher at the Department of Integrated Sciences for Global Society, Kyushu University, and a Coaching Fellow at the School of Global Humanities and Social Sciences, Nagasaki University. Their research interests include gender and sexuality studies as well as sex education. They are currently working on projects that explore the functionality of queer student groups on Japanese campuses and the experiences of queer expatriates in Japan. They are also part of the leadership board of Stonewall Japan, an organization aiming at cultivating safe and inclusive space for LGBTQIA + individuals in Japan.

Ahmed Ragab

Ahmed Ragab is a historian, physician and a documentary filmmaker. He is associate professor of the history of medicine at Johns Hopkins University, the founding director of the independent Center for Black, Brown, and Queer Studies, and co-founder of Pinwheel Productions—a film production studio dedicated to supporting Black, Brown and Queer artists and stories. He received his medical degree from Cairo University School of Medicine in 2005, and PhD from the Ecole Pratiques des Hautes Etudes in Paris in 2010. He is the author of The Medieval Islamic Hospital (Cambridge, 2015), Piety and Patienthood in Medieval Islam (Routledge, 2018) and Medicine and Religion in the Life of an Ottoman Sheikh (Routledge, 2019).

Francisco Sanchez Torres

PhD candidate in Classics in the University of Cádiz (Spain). His research addresses Spanish culture in Latin in the Early Modern period, making a critical edition of Juan de Mariana's political treatise De Rege et Regis institutione. Furthermore, he carries research on Queer Studies applied to Classical Studies. He is currently working on an anthology *Ageing Bodies, Ageist Cultures: Growing Older in India* (working title, Routledge), with a focus on queer ageing and a special journal issue on queer pedagogy in the Indian academia.

An activist for gender rights, he is a member of the editorial advisory board of *Queer Studies* in *Media and Popular Culture* (Intellect Bks.), and an occasional contributor to *InPlainspeak*, the digital magazine of TARSHI (Talking About Reproductive and Sexuality Health in India).

He has published in several international peer-reviewed journals such as South Asian Review (2012), Postcolonial Text (2015), New Cinemas: Journal of Contemporary Film (2013), South

Asian History and Culture (2015, 2017 and 2021), South Asian Popular Culture (2018) and Café Dissensus (2018).

Graduate Educational Researcher at North East Lincolnshire Council since September 2021. She is currently working within the Looked After Children & Inclusion division of Children's Services. Her research interests spin around LGBTI and feminist theories and political practices, memories and archives, queer pedagogies, and queer kinship and reproduction. She has been part of national and international research projects (such as the HERA project Cruising the 1970s, CRUSEV, or Diversity and childhood), and has been visiting professor at the Universidad de Buenos Aires (2011), FLACSO in Quito, Ecuador (2014), Birkbeck Institute for Social Research, University of London (2016) and Humboldt University of Berlin (2019).

She has published widely on indexed journals like Sexualities, Educação y Pesquisa, Politics and Society, and Journal of Youth Studies, among others, and has written two books, Desire and Resistance. Thirty years of Lesbian Mobilization in Spain (1977- 2007) (Egales, 2008; reedited in 2020), and Queer feminism is for everybody (Catarata, 2022). She has also coedited four volumes: Parties, Memories and Archives. Dissident Sexual Politics and Daily Resistances in Spain in the Seventies (Brumaria, 2019, 2nd edition in 2020); Reimagining Sexual Dissidence in 1970s Spain (Bellaterra, 2019); Queer Motherhoods (Egales, 2020) and Queer Epistemologies in Education. Luso- Hispanic Dialogues and Shared Horizons (Palgrave, 2020).
